

Message from the President

There was a recent Pew research poll about Jews in America. One of the major findings was that the Jewish community is becoming more secular. This confirmed what I already felt is true. I think more and more Jews are embracing their culture while eschewing religion. What also may be true is that more are admitting they feel this way.

The study found that most Jews tend to be very tolerant about the level of belief other Jews feel. Most feel that working on the Sabbath or not believing in god does not exclude them from being Jewish, although believing Jesus is the messiah does. In fact, the cultural aspect of Judaism tends to outweigh the religious aspect.

The poll found Jews tend to be more educated and earn more money than the general population. Also, Jews tend more to the left politically.

One of the things the poll found that I think will ensure Jews stay around for many years is the sense of pride we have in being Jewish. We see this all the time. We are always identifying famous Jews, whether it's in music, movies, politics, or just people you meet.

TVCJ Chanukah Party - December 1

Our traditional Chanukah party is a group effort with crafts for the kids and adults in the kitchen cooking latkes.

We are also participating again in the Holiday Giving Program, sponsored by JFCS/East Bay, who will assign us a family to "adopt" and for whom we can purchase gifts to help them get started. The Holiday Giving Program serves newcomer refugees and immigrants from the former Soviet Union, Afghanistan, Bosnia, Iran, Iraq, and Latin America, as well as low-income families in need in Oakland.

We won't know who the family is until the week prior to Chanukah so if you would like to bring an actual gift you can email us at that time for age and gender of family members. Or, JFCS is requesting gift cards so that families can have more autonomy and purchase what they need themselves. We will have a wrapping station available to wrap and label the gifts. In addition, we will, along with other Bay Area congregations, be collecting money for the food bank. For every \$1 you donate, the food bank can buy \$4 worth of food, so please be generous. (See flyer.)

Another new activity – a gift exchange among ourselves. Please bring a wrapped gift for someone of your similar age range adults for adult and child for child and we will play a gift exchange game. Please keep the gifts a reasonable price, between \$10 and \$15.

Our JCS students will be performing a skit and songs for us during the event as well as doing a menorah lighting ceremony.

New exhibitions at The Contemporary Jewish Museum in San Francisco

These exhibitions explore utopia and the role of the kibbutz in the creation of a new, better world.

Work in Progress: Considering Utopia presents new work by three artists and encourages visitors to consider the concept of utopia both in a Jewish context and from a contemporary perspective that emphasizes community and participation. Two videos and five photographs by Oded Hirsch feature members of the artist's kibbutz engaging in communal activities. Ohad Meromi's striking sculptural installation inspired by the Chadar Ochel [dining hall] of the kibbutz encourages discussions about the meaning of utopia today, and Elisheva Biernoff's interactive magnet painting allows visitors to construct their own utopian vista. The companion exhibition, To Build & Be Built: Kibbutz History explores and celebrates the kibbutz as it starts its second century. The exhibition focuses on the growth and development of these unique communities which helped create the infrastructure and culture of the State of Israel, and which are now transforming themselves as Israel becomes increasingly urban and capitalistic. The influence of the kibbutz on national and Bay Area culture—including many summer camps, youth movements, and "intentional communities"—is also addressed.
